



The Seder is the traditional meal of the Passover, which Jesus ate the night before he was crucified. The meal is comprised of different sections of reading, eating and drinking, telling stories, and singing – all done within a specific order to commemorate the liberation of Israel from Egypt, and as Christians, we celebrate our freedom from sin through Christ's sacrifice.



What You Will Need

At Each Place Around the Table:

- ☆ Parsley (2 sprigs)
- ☆ Charoseth (1 tablespoon)
 Finely chopped apples, nuts, honey, cinnamon and
 a touch of grape juice, mixed to your liking. (The
 other elements may be added to a base of apple
 butter to simplify preparation and give a paste-like
 consistency.)
- ☆ Grape Juice (1 cup with 6-8 ounces)

 The full meal requires four cups of juice per person.

 You may provide four cups each or refill the single cup four times during the ceremony.

- ☆ Saltwater (1 small bowl/cup per 4-5 people) Add enough salt to cloud the water.
- ☼ Horseradish (1/2 teaspoon) Make it as "biting" or bitter as possible for the participants to tolerate.
- Matzo (plain, 1/4 square)
 Unleavened bread.

At the Leader's Place Setting, Also Add:

- □ 1 bowl of saltwater
- ★ 1 lamb bone
 meatless and oven-roasted until browned
- ★ 3 Whole Matzo Squares and 4 Napkins
 Stacked matzos between the napkins on a plate.
- ★ 1 roasted egg Boil for 10 minutes; then place it under oven broiler until shell is browned.
- A 1 small basin or bowl with clean water and a small towel
 Used to symbolically wash hands
- ☆ 2 white candles in candlesticks
 Place in the center of the table.

At the Extra Setting for "Elijah:"

Keep this the same as the other "per person" settings., with one exception – this place will only have one glass of juice left next to the plate. This symbolizes the future appearance of Elijah, who will signify the coming of the Messiah.

Additional Items Needed:

- A few crumbs of leavened bread
- ⇔ Broom and dustpan for cleaning up leaven
- ☼ Special plate and cup for leader If an official Seder plate is used, be sure to explain what it looks like and invite participants to look at it after the ceremony is finished.
- A small present for the child who finds the

- hidden matzo (candy, coins, or other treat)
- *★* **A copy of the four questions** *marked for the child who asks the questions*
- *★* A copy of the opening comment marked for the mother to read
- ☆ Matches or a lighter to light the candles
